### About Justice Marcus Clark – A Working Justice and Leader

Justice Marcus R. Clark was born on February 24, 1956, in Sulphur to Gerald and Hilda Clark. He credits his dad, Gerald, for preparing him best for his work in public service by teaching him the importance of a strong work ethic at an early age, while working in the family owned laundromat.

After graduating from Sulphur High School in 1974, Justice Clark enrolled in Northeast Louisiana University, now known as the **University of Louisiana at Monroe**, and earned a degree in **Criminal Justice**. He immediately went to work for the **Ouachita Parish Sheriff's Office** where he earned the title of Detective before leaving to attend the **Paul M. Hebert Law Center at Louisiana State University**. After graduation, he was offered a job with the **Ouachita Parish District Attorney's Office** and quickly earned the title of **Chief Felony Drug Prosecutor**. He is the Co-Author of the Louisiana Drug Asset Forfeiture Law and Co-Author of the National TOP Gun Seminar.

Justice Clark began his judicial career in 1997 when he was elected **District Judge to the Fourth Judicial District Court**. During his tenure as judge he volunteered to serve as a **Drug Court Judge** from 2000-2001 for the newly developing Drug Court Program, and served as **Chief Judge** from 2004-2006. In addition to service on many professional and community awareness committees, he enjoys lecturing and has been a repeat lecturer for the North Delta Police Training Academy, Louisiana Sheriff's Association, Louisiana District Attorney's Association, and the Louisiana District Judges Association.

In 2009, Justice Clark was elected to the Louisiana Supreme Court to fill the **unexpired term** of retiring Justice Chet Traylor. He currently serves on several boards and committees including Chairman of the Budgetary Control Board. In this role he works with the Legislature and Governor to fund the entire Louisiana Judiciary. He is also active in bringing the efficiencies of today's technology to the Louisiana Court System

Justice Clark's home is in West Monroe, where he resides with his wife Allyson, a neo-natal nurse at St. Francis Medical Center, and his two children, Nicole and Cooper.

### About the Election

Justice Clark will stand for reelection, and election to **his first full term on the Supreme Court**, on Tuesday, November 8, 2016. The Campaign Committee is collecting donations even though there are no announced opponents and by raising money the Committee hopes to keep it that way.

### **CORPORATE AND PERSONAL DONATIONS ARE ALLOWED BY LOUISIANA LAW**

Donations are limited to \$5,000 per person and a "person" by Louisiana law is an individual (husband can be one individual, wife another individual, and separate checks should be used), a corporation, a partnership, or an LLC. The Louisiana Ethics Board has issued an advisory opinion that single member LLCs and their owner are subject to a single limit. The same opinion stated that S-corporations that are 100% owned by one individual are subject to the same limit. State law requires us to use our best efforts to collect and report the name and mailing address of individuals who donate. Donations are not tax deductible.
